Please make sure to have a valid subway ticket for the excursions. It is recommended to buy an Oyster Card: an Oyster card is a form of electronic ticketing used on public transport in Greater London (bus, tube, tram, London Overground and most National Rail services in London). It is the cheapest and easiest way to pay for travel in London. You can buy an Oyster Card at all stations in London. ## **Good Places to have lunch**

The Museum is on Albert Street in Camden Town, just off Parkway – a street with many shops, restaurants, and cafes covering all price ranges. There are too many options to list, so this is just a short summary.

### **Shops**

Co-op supermarket, Parkway (almost directly opposite Albert Street)  
Mini supermarket with selection of sandwiches, snacks etc.

Whole Foods, 49 Parkway  
Deli, burritos, salads, hot and cold food

### **Restaurants**

Viet-anh Cafe (Vietnamese), 41 Parkway, NW1 7PN  
Good value and usually very quick service

Bento Ramen (Japanese) 29-31 Parkway, NW1 7PN  
Good value, lots of lunch offers

Pizza Express, 85 Parkway, NW1 7PP  
Well established, good value pizza chain

Goodfare Restaurant (Italian), 26 Parkway  
Long running Italian café and restaurant, family run

Yumchaa (tea shop and café), 35-37 Parkway  
Cosy tea shop, serves many varieties of tea, cakes and sandwiches

### **Camden Market**

Camden Market is one of the biggest networks of markets in London and a major tourist attraction (it gets very busy!). It has a number of food courts, indoor and outdoor, which serve food from all around the world often at very cheap prices. It is a 5-10 minute walk from the Museum.
